INTRODUCTION

Government College Sarkaghat was established by Himachal Pradesh Government as a multi faculty, co-educational institute in the year 1985. Now, it has been renamed as Rabindranath Tagore Govt. Degree College Sarkaghat. Since its inception, it has progressively emerged as one of the leading institution of higher learning in the rural area of Himachal Pradesh. The college is affiliated to Sardar Patel University Mandi w.e.f. Academic session 2022-23, recognized by UGC under 2f & 12B and NAAC accredited B grade in August, 2019. Located at a distance of 60 Kilometers from the district town of Mandi (H.P.), this college is situated on the outskirts of Sarkaghat town, in a lush green area in the foothills of Chandrakhri and Maseran & Bhatoh ranges. With a campus spread over almost 15 acres of a landmass, the college has a big playground with facilities for the entire major outdoor games. (NEP-2020)

CURRICULUM AND CREDIT FRAMEWORK FOR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES (NEP-2020) will be implemented in phased manner.

1. Introduction

The National Education Policy 2020 recognises that higher education plays a crucial role in promoting human and societal well-being, and in developing India as envisioned in its Constitution — a democratic, just, socially conscious, and humane nation that upholds liberty, equality, fraternity, and justice for all. The NEP 2020 notes, “Given the 21st-century requirements, quality higher education must aim to develop good, thoughtful, well-rounded, and creative individuals.”

The NEP 2020 states, “Assessments of educational approaches in undergraduate education that integrate the humanities and arts with Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) have consistently shown positive learning outcomes, including increased creativity and innovation, critical thinking and higher-order thinking capacities, problem-solving abilities, teamwork, communication skills, more in-depth learning and mastery of curricula across fields, increases in social and moral awareness, etc., besides general engagement and enjoyment of learning.”

Further, the NEP 2020 also recommends that “the undergraduate degree will be of either 3- or 4-year duration, with multiple exit options within this period, with appropriate certifications.”

In accordance with the NEP 2020, the University Grants Commission has formulated a new student-centric “Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (UGC-CCFUGP 2022)” incorporating a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, and multiple entry and exit options, which will facilitate students in pursuing their career path by choosing the subject/field of their interest.

Based on the UGC-CCFUGP notified in December 2022, Himachal Pradesh University has developed a Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes (HPU-CCFUGP, hereafter HPU-UGP), incorporating all essential aspects of the UGC-CCFUGP to facilitate the achievement of the policy visions stated in the NEP 2020. This HPU-UGP will also apply to the professional courses not covered by other regulatory bodies.

2. New Curriculum and Credit Framework

The aims and objectives of the Curriculum and Credit Framework under NEP 2020 are to highlight certain fundamental principles that will guide both the education system as a whole and individual educational institutions. These objectives, as stated below, have a direct bearing on the curricula for different levels of higher education:

- i. First of all, the policy endeavours to recognise, identify, and foster the unique capabilities of each student to promote their holistic development.
- ii. It also attempts to provide flexibility, allowing learners to select their learning trajectories and programmes, and thereby choose their path in life according to their talents and interests.
- iii. The policy promises to provide multidisciplinary and holistic education across the sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities, and sports for an interdisciplinary world.
- iv. It emphasises conceptual understanding rather than rote learning. The policy also aims to foster critical thinking and encourages learners to make logical decisions.
- v. The policy upholds ethics, and human & constitutional values and emphasises building life skills such as communication, teamwork, leadership, and resilience.
- vi. The policy also emphasises the extensive use of technology in teaching and learning, removing language barriers, increasing access for students with disabilities (Divyang), and enhancing educational planning and management.
- vii. The policy aims to ensure respect for diversity and the local context in all curricula, pedagogy, and policies.
- viii. The policy emphasises equity and inclusion as the cornerstone of all educational decisions, ensuring that all students can thrive in the education system. It also ensures that the institutional environment is responsive to differences, thereby making high-quality education available to all.
- ix. The policy also aims to ensure that the education system is grounded in the values of Indian civilisation

and fosters pride in India and its rich, diverse, ancient, and modern culture, languages, knowledge systems, and traditions.

3. Curricular Goals

The new student-centric CCFUGP of UGC introduces holistic and multidisciplinary undergraduate education that would help develop all capacities of human beings — intellectual, aesthetic, social, physical, emotional, ethical, and moral — in an integrated manner; soft skills, such as complex problem-solving, critical thinking, creative thinking, communication skills; and rigorous specialization in a chosen field(s) of learning.

The curricular and credit framework of CCFUGP under NEP 2020 seeks to ensure the following for the students:

- i. Flexibility to move from one discipline of study to another;
- ii. Opportunity for learners to choose the courses of their interest in all disciplines;
- iii. Facilitating multiple entry and exit options with a UG certificate/UG diploma/or degree, depending upon the number of credits secured;
- iv. Flexibility for learners to move from one institution to another to enable them to have multi- and/or interdisciplinary learning;
- v. Flexibility to switch to alternative modes of learning (offline, ODL, online learning, and hybrid modes of learning).

4. Outcome-Based Approach

The National Higher Education Qualification Framework (NHEQF) envisages that students must possess the quality and characteristics of the graduate of a programme of study, including learning outcomes relating to the disciplinary area(s) in the chosen field(s) of learning and generic learning outcomes that are expected to be acquired by a graduate on completion of the programme(s) of study.

The New Curriculum Framework for UG Programmes envisages that graduate attributes are fostered through meaningful learning experiences made available through the curriculum and learning experience, the total college/university experience, and a process of critical and reflective thinking. The graduate attributes expected of all students to acquire and demonstrate through the New Curriculum Framework for UG programmes are given under clause 30 (pp. 36–41).

5. UG Degree Programmes

The UGC-CCFUGP: 3.2.3 offers various undergraduate degree programmes for students to choose from. The different UG Degree programmes are:

i. UG Degree Programmes with Single Major

A student must secure a minimum of 50% credits in the major discipline for a 3-year/4-year UG Degree to be awarded a single major.

For example:

In a 3-year UG programme, the total number of credits to be earned is 128; a student of History with 64 credits will be awarded a Bachelor of Arts in History with a single major.

Similarly, in a 4-year UG programme, the total number of credits to be earned is 168; a student of History with a minimum of 84 credits will be awarded a Bachelor of Arts (Honours or Honours with Research) in History with a single Major.

ii. UG Degree Programmes with Double Major

A student must secure a minimum of 40% credits in the second major discipline for the 3-year/4-year UG degree to be awarded a double major.

iii. Interdisciplinary Undergraduate Programmes

The credits for core courses shall be distributed among the constituent disciplines/subjects to achieve core competence in the multidisciplinary programme.

For example:

A student opts for (a) Mathematics, (b) Statistics, and (c) Physics for a UG programme. The degree for such students will be a Bachelor of Physical Science, awarded after a 3-year undergraduate programme.

For such a candidate, to pursue a degree in the fourth year, they shall have to choose only one of the disciplines (A, B or C) in which they have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years. The degree will be awarded as Bachelor of Physical Sciences (Honours or Honours with Research) in Physics (if Physics is chosen) for a 4-year undergraduate programme.

iv. Multidisciplinary Undergraduate Programmes

For students pursuing a multidisciplinary programme of study, the credits for core courses will be distributed across various broad disciplines, including Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical and Computer Sciences, Data Analysis, Social Sciences, and Humanities.

For example:

A student who opts for a UG programme in Life Sciences will have the total credits to core courses distributed across (a) Botany, (b) Zoology, and (c) Human Biology disciplines. The degree will be awarded as a Bachelor's in Life Sciences for a 3-year UG programme. For such a candidate, to pursue a degree in the fourth year, he/she shall have to choose only one of the disciplines (either A, B or C) in which he/she has studied at least 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs of Core/Major courses in the first three years. The degree awarded will be Bachelor of Life Science (Honours or Honours with Research) in Botany (if Botany is chosen) for a 4-year UG Programme.

At the initial stage of implementation of NEP 2020, students shall have the following Degree Options:

A. The 3-year UG Programme shall have two degree options:

i. Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary

ii. Single Core Discipline (Major)

- The students shall declare their Major and Minor finally at the end of the second semester.
- In both cases, the requirements of core and common courses remain the same.

B. The Four-year UG Programme shall have two degree options:

i. Honours

ii. Honours with Research

- Students with 3-year Degrees in the Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary programme will have to choose, in the fourth year, only one of the disciplines in which they have studied six DSCs and five DSEs in the first three years.
- Students with a 3-year undergraduate degree in a Single Core Discipline (Major) will pursue a fourth year in their Major discipline.

C. Other UG Programmes

The other UG Programmes, including Double Major, will be initiated in a phased manner in due course of time.

6. Programme Components

Towards the attainment of holistic and multidisciplinary education, the HEI/College will offer courses from every Department before the commencement of each semester, listing the courses for Major, Minors, Discipline-Specific Electives, Multidisciplinary Studies, Ability Enhancement, Skill Enhancement, and Value Addition, along with the offering departments and course in-charges. This will enable students to select the courses of their choice.

The entire 3-year/4-year UG programme curriculum is divided into two parts:

a. Core Courses

b. Common Courses

A. List of Core Courses

The core courses comprise Discipline-Specific, Discipline-Specific Elective (DSE), and Minor courses. All core courses have a credit allocation of 4. Altogether, irrespective of any major or minor options, a student will necessarily need to study 23 courses with a total credit allocation of 92 over a 3-year programme. The degrees relevant to the core courses will be awarded.

i. Major Courses

Courses offered by a particular department for its own students. The minimum credit requirement for a Single Core Discipline (Major) over 3 years is 64, which translates to 16 courses, including 5 DSEs.

ii. Minor Courses

One of the Major courses offered by the Department shall be treated as a Minor for students of other departments. The department may also offer a separate course or repeat the same course(s) as a Minor for students of other departments. The minimum credit requirement for a Minor Course over 3 years is 24, which translates to 6 courses.

B. List of Common Courses

As the name suggests, these courses must be studied by all students in the 3-year or 4-year undergraduate programme. Together, the common courses have a credit allocation of 36, divided over five subdivisions.

i. Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC): Total Credits – 9

Courses offered by a particular department shall be considered multidisciplinary for students of other departments. A student cannot opt for an MDC catering to their Core Courses (Major and Minor). The student should be motivated to opt for a different subject each semester.

ii. Ability Enhancement Course (AEC): Total Credits – 8

Courses on Language and Communication Skills, viz. English, Hindi, and Sanskrit.

iii. Skill Enhancement Course (SEC): Total Credits – 9

The HEI/College will identify the Skill Enhancement Courses to be offered in a semester, and students will choose the skill course of his/her choice from the courses offered.

iv. I/A/P/C (or Work-based Vocational Course*): Total Credits – 4

Internship/Apprenticeship/Minor Project/Community Outreach (I/A/P/C) or Work-based Vocational Courses are courses common to all students and will be carried out during the winter and summer terms/vacations. Although offered in the second semester, students may be encouraged to make their choice at the end of the first semester, allowing them to carry out activities during winter vacation as well.

* This course will not be offered in the first (beginning) academic session.

v. Value-Addition Course (VAC): Total Credits – 6

These are the course(s) common to all students to be offered as a VAC category in a particular semester. The HEI/College will assign one or more teachers to teach these courses as required, regardless of the teacher's background or qualifications.

7. New Programmes and Courses

Himachal Pradesh University may edit or deactivate any existing programmes/courses and offer new ones in subsequent academic years. HPU enables affiliated colleges, institutions, councils, and other agencies to propose new programmes and courses, which will be considered by relevant bodies in alignment with the National Higher Education Qualifications Framework (NHEQF) and the National Curriculum Framework (NCrF) guidelines.

8. Eligibility for the UG Programmes

a. A student who has passed 12th standard or an equivalent examination in any stream from a recognised institution (UGC-CCFUGP: 3.2.3).

b.

Admission to the 3-year/4-year UG programme will be based on the preference of the Major, if any. In case a student does not want to opt for any major in the 3-year programme, they will be admitted based on their preferences for subject combinations.

c.

Admission to a discipline-specific course or Major will be subject to the availability of the subject and the capacity of the college/department/centre.

d.

No student shall be eligible for admission to a programme in any discipline unless s/he fulfils the prerequisites of courses as fixed by the university.

9. Reservation

The statutory reservation policy of the Government of Himachal Pradesh shall be followed in the selection of eligible candidates for admission.

10. Academic Bank of Credits (ABC)

The HPU-UGP is directly connected to the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) as notified by the UGC. All credits a student earns at the end of an examination in HPU-UGP will be deposited in the ABC by the university.

As such, a student under HPU-UGP must register for the ABC as notified by the regulatory agencies.

11. Duration for Award of UG Certificate, UG Diploma and Degree

The UG Programmes will be of either 3- or 4-year duration with appropriate certifications and exits, such as:

- i. UG Certificate after completing 1 year (2 semesters) of study in the chosen fields of study with 44 credits, including four credits in I/A/P/C or work-based vocational course(s) offered during winter or summer term.
- ii. UG Diploma after 2 years (4 semesters) of study with 86 credits.
- iii. 3-Year Bachelor's Degree after successful completion of three years (6 semesters) with 128 credits.
- iv. 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours) after successful completion of four years (8 semesters) with 168 credits.
- v. 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research) after successful completion of four years (8 semesters) with a Research Project or Dissertation under the guidance of an eligible regular faculty member, securing 168 credits, out of which 12 credits will be for the Research Project or Dissertation.
- vi. Students will be permitted to take a break from the study during the period of study, but the total duration of completing the programme shall not exceed 7 years.

It should be noted that any certificate/diploma/degree is awarded only if the student clears (i.e., passes) all the required courses (papers) up to that point in time.

Note: College/CDOE/Department/HPU-DES will decide whether to offer a 3-year or 4-year undergraduate programme before the academic session starts. However, the 4-Year Bachelor's Degree Programme may be considered a preferred option, as it would provide an opportunity to experience the full range of holistic and multidisciplinary education (vide UGC letter No. 27-3/2023 (CU) dated 28th March 2023).

12. Change of Programme

The students who wish to change programmes in the 2nd year (or third semester) shall be eligible only for the 3-year B.A. programme (Multidisciplinary), subject to availability of seats and the Major programme in the College and earning of additional credits (8 each in each of the two core Major disciplines).

Two courses of any one discipline studied in the first two semesters will be treated as a Minor. The remaining 16 credits shall be earned from a single Minor discipline.

13. Multiple Exits and Entries

As permissible under UGC Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions, students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and exit after even semesters, provided that they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.

For example, a student can exit a programme after one year and then re-enter the programme at a later time, continuing from where they left off. This process can be executed multiple times. However, entry into the programme is subject to the availability of positions at the institute/college at that time.

An institution can increase the number of seats by ten per cent to accommodate students re-entering the programme or coming from a different institution. Besides, the following should apply:

- a. A student will receive a certificate/diploma/degree upon exiting the HPU-UGP (depending on the year of graduation), provided they have passed all the minimum compulsory courses at that point in time.
- b. After exiting, either at the end of Year 1 or Year 2, the student can seek entry only into the same programme to which they were initially admitted.

c. When a student exits the HPU-UGP after 3 years with a Bachelor's Degree, s/he cannot seek re-entry into the programme in the fourth year; instead, they will need to take admission into the Master's programme in the first year.

d. Students with a UG degree with Honours after 4 years will have to take admission into the second year of a 2-year Master's programme.

e. Students with a UG degree with Honours and Research after 4 years can directly progress to a PhD programme, provided they secure a minimum of 75% marks.

f. As the contents (syllabi) of all courses are subject to modification from time to time, when a student re-enters the programme after an earlier exit, they must study the content of all courses available at that time.

The Multiple Entry and Exit policy shall also include students from other Universities and Colleges affiliated with other Universities who wish to join H.P. University or its affiliated colleges. The admission of such students shall be based on the merit of their score in the previous semesters and availability of seats.

14. Migration

Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme through the regular mode (i.e., a student from any college affiliated with H.P. University) can transfer their admission to CDOE at any point during a semester.

Such a student, however, shall have to pay the complete semester fee of the concerned semester as well, irrespective of the duration of the semester gone by.

Students pursuing their 3-year Undergraduate programme from CDOE can be migrated or admitted as regular students to colleges against vacant seats at the beginning of the semesters.

15. Inter-Institution Mobility

The HPU-UGP enables students to engage in inter-institutional mobility, both for incoming and outgoing students. For this, HPU will take into account the credits that the student has in their ABC.

For an incoming student, the following should be observed:

a. The entry is subject to the availability of seats in the concerned discipline.

b. The student must fulfil all the academic prerequisites of the relevant discipline.

c. HPU will award a degree to a student only when the student has completed at least 60% of the credits for core courses offered by HPU.

16. Infrastructure Requirements

College/CDOE/Department/HPU-DES may offer a 3-year Major programme and a 4-year Honours programme, depending upon the required infrastructure and faculty positions.

After the 3-year programme, students also have the option to join the first year of the 2-year Master's Degree programme in Universities and Colleges.

Offering a 4-year undergraduate degree (Honours with Research) requires additional infrastructure, including a library, access to journals, a computer lab and software, laboratory facilities for experimental research, and at least two permanent faculty members who are recognised as PhD Supervisors.

Students who secure 75% or more marks in the first three years shall be eligible for a 4-Year UG Degree (Honours with Research).

UG Degree (Honours with Research) will be offered subject to prior approval from HPU.

17. Option for Online Courses

To achieve the three cardinal principles of India's Education Policy — Access, Equity, and Quality — and for the benefit of students, options will be given for students to earn credit by completing quality-assured online programmes offered on the Study Webs of Active Learning for Young Aspiring Minds (SWAYAM: www.swayam.gov.in) or other online educational platforms approved by HPU as per the existing UGC regulations.

Students may opt to earn credits from such courses up to 40 per cent of the total requirements, including I/A/P/C or work-based Vocational courses. (For details, see HPU SWAYAM Policy.)

18. Programme Structure

Semester

A semester comprises 90 working days, and the academic calendar is divided into two semesters.

Winter and Summer terms will be notified separately with a vacation schedule. I/A/P/C or work-based vocational education, field-based learning, and training will be carried out during the winter and summer terms.

Regular courses may also be offered during the winter or summer terms in a fast-track mode, enabling students to complete additional coursework and reduce backlogs.

Arrangements may be made for courses to be offered in the winter or summer terms, depending on the availability of faculty and the number of students.

18.2 Credit Hours

The workload relating to a course is measured in terms of credit hours. A credit is a unit by which the coursework is measured. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum of 15 weeks).

Each course may have only a lecture component, a lecture and tutorial component, a lecture and practicum component, a lecture, tutorial, and practicum component, or only a practicum component.

For example:

A three-credit lecture course in a semester consists of 3 one-hour lectures per week, with each one-hour lecture course being counted as one credit. In a 15-week semester, a three-credit lecture course is equivalent to 45 hours (3 hours per week \times 15 weeks) of teaching.

One credit for tutorial work means one hour of engagement per week. In a 15-week semester, a one-credit tutorial in a course is equivalent to 15 hours of engagement.

A one-credit course in practicum or lab work, community engagement and services, and field work, completed in a semester, requires two hours of engagement per week. In a 15-week semester, a one-credit practicum in a course is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.

A one-credit course, such as Seminar, Internship, Studio activities, or Field practice/projects, or Community engagement and service, requires two hours of engagement per week. Accordingly, in a 15-week semester, one credit in these courses is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.

A one-credit course of Experiential Learning (field visits, industrial visits, etc.) means three hours of engagement per week. Accordingly, in a 15-week semester, one credit in these courses is equivalent to 45 hours of engagement.

A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits.

For example:

A 4-credit course, with three credits assigned for lectures and one credit for practicum, shall consist of three 1-hour lectures per week and one 2-hour duration field-based learning/project or lab work, or workshop activity per week. In a 15-week semester, a 4-credit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 30 hours of practicum.

Similarly, a 4-credit course with 3 credits assigned for lectures and one credit for tutorial shall have three 1-hour lectures per week and one 1-hour tutorial per week. In a 15-week semester, a 4-credit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 15 hours of tutorials.

Course Components

The courses will have a combination of various teaching methods as required. The methods may comprise the following:

- i. Lecture courses: Courses involving lectures relating to a field or discipline by an expert or qualified personnel in a field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice.**
- ii. Tutorial courses: Courses involving problem-solving and discussions relating to a field or discipline under the guidance of qualified personnel in a field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice.**
- iii. Practicum or Laboratory work: A course requiring students to participate in a project or**

practical or lab activity that applies previously learned/studied principles/theory related to the chosen field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice under the supervision of an expert or qualified individual in the field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice.

iv. **Seminar:** A course requiring students to participate in structured discussions/conversations or debates focused on assigned tasks/readings, current or historical events, or shared experiences guided or led by an expert or qualified personnel in a field of learning, work/vocation, or professional practice.

v. **Internship:** A course requiring students to participate in a professional activity or work experience, or cooperative education activity with an entity external to the educational institution, normally under the supervision of an expert of the given external entity.

vi. **Studio activities:** These involve students engaging in creative or artistic pursuits. Every student is engaged in performing a creative activity to obtain a specific outcome.

vii. **Field practice/projects:** Courses requiring students to participate in field-based learning/projects generally under the supervision of an expert of the given external entity.

viii. **Community engagement and service:** Courses requiring students to participate in field-based learning/projects generally under the supervision of an expert of the given external entity. The curricular component of community engagement and service would expose students to socio-economic issues in society, allowing theoretical learning to be supplemented by real-life experiences and generating solutions to actual problems.

Curricular Components

The UG curriculum consists of the following components:

i. Major Stream Courses

These are the disciplines or subjects of primary focus that provide students with the opportunity to pursue in-depth study of a particular discipline or subject, and the degree will be awarded in that discipline.

Students should secure at least 50% of the total credits in the major discipline. All major courses will be of 4 credits each.

ii. Minor Stream Courses

Minor courses help students gain a broader understanding beyond the major disciplines. Students will have the option to choose other disciplinary/interdisciplinary courses and skill-based courses relating to a chosen vocational education programme as a minor.

Students who take the prescribed number of courses in a discipline or interdisciplinary area of study other than the chosen major will qualify for a minor in that discipline or the chosen multidisciplinary area of study.

All minor courses will also be of 4 credits each.

iii. Multidisciplinary Courses

All students are required to undergo three introductory-level courses relating to broad disciplines. These courses are intended to broaden the intellectual experience and form part of liberal arts and science education.

All courses under the multidisciplinary category will be 3 credits each.

Categories include:

- Natural and Physical Sciences
- Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Applications
- Library, Information and Media Sciences
- Commerce and Management
- Humanities and Social Sciences

iv. Ability Enhancement Courses (Language and Communication Skill Courses)

Students are required to achieve competency in Modern Indian Language (MIL) and the English language, with special emphasis on language and communication skills.

The courses under this category will be assigned 2 credits each.

v. Skill Enhancement Courses

These courses are designed to impart practical skills, hands-on training, and soft skills to enhance employability. Each Skill Enhancement Course will be assigned 3 credits.

vi. Value-Addition Courses

These are courses common to all UG students. Each course under this category will be of 2 credits.

Categories include:

- Universal Human Values
- Understanding India
- Environmental Science / Education
- Digital and Technological Solutions
- Health & Wellness, Yoga Education, Sports, and Fitness

vii. Internship/Apprenticeship/Field Project

Each course under Internship/Apprenticeship/Field Project, Community Engagement / Field-based Learning / Minor Project will be of 4 credits.

viii. Research Project/Dissertation

Students choosing a 4-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research) are required to take research projects/dissertations under faculty guidance.

Research Project/Dissertation will be of 12 credits (4 in VII Semester and 8 in VIII Semester).

ix. Other Activities

This component includes participation in NSS, NCC, adult education/literacy initiatives, mentoring school students, and similar activities.

Note: All Value Addition Courses, I/A/P/C courses, and Work-based Vocational Courses must be taught by all teachers, regardless of their disciplinary background, depending on workload.

Credit Requirements

The minimum credit requirements of each category of courses for 3-Year and 4-Year Bachelor's Programmes (Honours or Honours with Research) are given below:

Note: Honours students not undertaking research will complete three courses for 12 credits instead of the Research Project/Dissertation.

19. Level of Courses

Courses shall be coded based on the learning outcomes, level of difficulty, and academic rigour.

- **0-99: Pre-requisite courses required to undertake an introductory course. These will be pass/fail courses with no credits.**
- **100-199: Foundation or introductory courses.**
- **200-299: Intermediate-level courses.**
- **300-399: Higher-level courses required for majoring in a disciplinary/interdisciplinary area.**

- **400–499: Advanced courses including seminars, research methodology, projects, internships, laboratory work, and postgraduate-level practical/theoretical courses.**

20. Semester-wise Programme Components

The UGC has prepared a model for the semester-wise distribution of different categories of courses. Based on this model, the UG Programme Structure is framed, and the semester-wise course and credit distribution of UG Programmes are presented in the tables below.

Semesters 1 & 2

Students will choose 3 discipline-specific (one stream) core courses (A, B, and C).

Students opting for a Single Core Discipline (Major) have to select a Major and Minor out of the 3 subjects studied in the 1st and 2nd semesters at the end of the 2nd semester. Another discipline's DSC/course studied in the first two semesters will be treated as a Minor.

Additionally, these students will also take courses of their interest from Multidisciplinary, Ability Enhancement, Skill Enhancement, and Value-Addition categories.

Students will also be placed in an internship/apprenticeship/field project, or community engagement and service programme, as well as participate in field-based learning/minor projects.

All the major and minor courses for the 1st & 2nd semesters will be 100-level courses.

Additional Seats

An additional 10% of the sanctioned strength may be created to accommodate requests for a change of Major. Any unfilled or vacant seats may be filled with those seeking a change of Major. Preference will be given to those with the highest CGPA and no arrears in the first year/semester.

Semesters 3 & 4

Students will select courses of interest in their Major and Minor to build a career of interest.

Students opting for the stream-based Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary UG programme will have to declare one of the three subjects as a Minor in the 3rd semester. The other two subjects will remain their Core (Major) subjects.

All students will study the DSE of core courses, excluding the Minor.

Students studying a Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary 3-year degree are strongly advised to choose one subject for all the DSEs in which they wish to do Honours or Honours with Research in the 4th year, as they must study at least 5 DSEs of that discipline in the 2nd and 3rd years.

They will also pursue courses from multidisciplinary, ability enhancement, skill enhancement, and value-addition categories.

The major courses of the 3rd & 4th semesters may be 200-level courses, while the level of minor courses may be 200 and above.

Semesters 5 & 6

Students will undertake higher-level courses and related courses during the 5th & 6th semesters to gain in-depth knowledge in the core courses, including DSEs (2 each) in the 5th & 6th semesters, along with an Ability Enhancement Course.

The major courses for the 5th & 6th semesters may be 300-level, and the level of minor courses may be 200 and above.

Semesters 7 & 8

During the fourth and final year, students will undertake advanced-level courses to earn a 4-year undergraduate degree.

Students opting for a Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research) will undertake a Research Project or Dissertation.

Students may be permitted to conduct a research project or dissertation in another department of the same

institution or at another institution, provided the required facilities are available.

The major courses of the 7th & 8th semesters may be 400-level, while the level of courses for minors may be 300-level and above.

The 7th-semester courses for students pursuing a Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research) will focus on research methodology and advanced courses in both theoretical and applied areas.

As part of the research methodology, students are also expected to undertake preparatory activities, such as writing research proposals, conducting laboratory experiments, collecting data, or engaging in fieldwork, for their research project or dissertation.

The 8th semester will be devoted to report writing and the presentation of Research Projects/Dissertations, along with major courses that may be seminar-based, featuring presentations and discussions.

For students opting for a Bachelor's Degree (Honours), the 7th & 8th semester courses for both Major and Minor will be advanced-level courses in theory and applied areas, as well as seminar presentations.

Honours students not undertaking research will take five advanced-level courses in the 8th semester.

21. Entry and Exit Options

As permissible under UGC Guidelines for Multiple Entry and Exit in Academic Programmes offered in Higher Education Institutions, students will be allowed to enter/re-enter in the odd semesters and exit after even semesters, provided that they fulfil the minimum requirements for entry and exit.

22. Attendance

A student shall be eligible to appear in the end-semester examination only if he/she has a minimum of 75% attendance.

The terms and rules governing condonation can be found in the Examination Section of the Ordinance.

23. Examination & Grading

The examination and grading modalities of HPU-UGP will be in accordance with HPU's Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications.

24. Repeating or Options for Other Courses

i. If a student fails a particular course, they shall be promoted to the next semester and shall repeat the course with the ensuing examinations.

ii. Repetition of course(s) shall be only for the end-of-semester examinations.

iii. In place of the failed courses, students may opt for the following in consultation with the parent department:

- Choose other courses with the same credits offered through CDOE.
- Choose online/CDOE courses approved by HPU as per existing UGC regulations, having the same credits.

25. Promotion

Students shall be allowed to proceed from one semester to the next in accordance with HPU's Examination and Grading Ordinance/Notifications.

However, for a student to progress to the 4th year of the undergraduate programme, they must clear all the courses from the previous three years.

26. Departmental Coordinators

The students will require proper guidance in selecting courses of their choice that align with the curriculum requirements.

Coordinator(s) may be appointed at College/CDOE/HPU-DES level to guide students in choosing courses, ensuring the timely completion of undergraduate programmes.

A template for monitoring students' progress can be developed to determine whether students are enrolled in the correct courses for a particular semester.

27. Evaluation Committee for Multiple Entry and Exit

While this HPU-UGP provides options for multiple entry and exit for HPU students, students from other HEIs who are willing to join HPU will also be allowed entry at an appropriate level.

The NAD Cell of HPU will evaluate the multiple entry and exit points to determine the eligibility of students who desire to join the University from other HEIs with lateral entry.

- In the first semester, students will be offered three different subjects within the same stream: A, B, and C.
- At the end of the second semester, each student may choose one of two programmes:
 - Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary
 - Single Core Discipline (Major)
- Additional Seats: Colleges may create 10% extra seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate requests for a change of Major.
- The DSCs of another discipline for the first two semesters of students who opt for Major programmes will be treated as Minors.
- A DSC offered in one discipline will be treated as a Minor by another.
- MDCs must be selected from a broad discipline/pool other than Major and Minor subjects.
- AEC/VAC/SEC-3 should be chosen from a pool of courses.
- A maximum of two language courses can be opted for as Core and Minor.
- I/A/P/C will be determined at the end of the first semester.
- To pursue an Honours degree in the 4th year, students will have to choose only one discipline in which they have studied 6 DSCs and 5 DSEs in the first three years.
- A student who secures 75% or more marks in aggregate till Semester VI shall be eligible for a 4-year degree Honours with Research.
- One course per semester from a subject offered in two or more different programmes must be the same.
- Students in BA programmes can opt for only one DSC each from Bachelor of Performing Arts or Bachelor of Fine Arts.
- Major and Minor shall be awarded on fulfilment of prescribed credit conditions.
- The Dissertation and Project will start in the VII semester, but evaluation and assessment will be conducted in both VII and VIII semesters.

* As this scheme is being introduced for the first time, it is subject to modifications. Any changes applied in subsequent years after admission to the 1st year will be retrospectively applicable.

GENERAL RULES FOR ADMISSION TO UNDER GRADUATE CLASSES:

1. Admission to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. 1st year Classes will be strictly on fulfillment of eligibility conditions as under:
 - a) A pass in the Senior Secondary (+2) Examination (Academic Stream) conducted by the H.P Board of School Education (or in case of *Shashtri*, pass in *Prak Shashtri* from Sanskrit Colleges affiliated to the SPU) or an examination accepted as equivalent there to by the various bodies of the H.P. University.
 - i. Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with science stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Sc. programme.
 - ii. Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Com. programme.

OR

- Senior Secondary School Certificate Examination (Class XII) of the Central Board of Secondary Education, New Delhi or an examination recognised as equivalent thereto with Maths/ Economics as compulsory subject. The aggregate marks required will be determined on the basis of one language and three other pass elective subjects.
2. An applicant must not be more than 23 years of age (25 years for girls only) as on 01/07/2025. The upper age limit is raised to 26 years for SC and ST applicants. However, in case of overage applicant the Principal, at his discretion, may give relaxation of 6 months to the eligible students. However, their cases will have to be sent to the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, Sardar Patel University for his kind approval.
3. An applicant having passed 10+2 examination with English as one of the compulsory subjects from any Board/University recognized by H.P Govt. or Sardar Patel University or Association of Indian Universities can seek admission to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. 1st year.

4. Students coming from Vocational Stream without having Maths/Economics and Maths/Biology, as the case may be, as one of the compulsory subjects at +2 level shall be admitted to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. 1styear. as per the requisite minimum pass percentage prescribed for admission to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. 1styear.
5. Admission to the various classes will be made on merit and on the recommendation of the admission committee constituted for the purpose.
6. SC/ST students seeking admission in B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. 1styear, will be given 5% relaxation in minimum qualifying marks as per SPU rules.
7. For determining the eligibility, percentage of 0.5 and above shall be counted as one.

8. Admission is also open to an applicant who has an equivalent degree from Foreign University/ Board/College which is recognized by H.P. Govt. or Sardar Patel University or Association of Indian Universities provided the applicant fulfils the minimum eligibility conditions.
9. Admission of a student is liable to be cancelled in case he/she furnishes incomplete/wrong/false information or in case of concealment of facts. Disciplinary action will also be taken against such candidate.
10. Initially all admission shall be provisional and subject to the final approval by Sardar Patel University.
11. Rules of admission are subject to change as per the Sardar Patel University notifications issued from time to time.
12. Any gap of year or more in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by documentary evidence/affidavit as the proof of his/her activities during the period of gap. Submission of false affidavit is a legal offence.
13. The applicant must fill up the Application Form in his/her handwriting and get it signed by his/her parents/local guardian.
14. The Application Form must be completed in all respects along with the following documents:
 - a) Self-attested copies of detailed marks card of the previous examinations passed. In case of non-receipt of this certificate, the applicant must attach the certificate issued by the Head of the Institution last attended.
 - b) Self-attested copy of Matriculation certificate for verification of date of birth.
 - c) Original Character certificate from the institution last attended.
15. Applicant must produce original certificates at the time of admission.
16. Applicant coming from Boards/Universities other than H.P Board of School Education Dharamshala / Sardar Patel University Mandi must provide migration certificate in original.
17. Girls students seeking admission in any class must bring an attested copy of H.P. Bonafide certificate to avail themselves the benefit of tuition fee-concession.
18. Divyang student seeking exemption from tuition fee on the basis of disability must attach an attested copy of 40% or more disability certificate from the competent Authority.
19. All terms and conditions and fee structure can be changed or modified as per the directions or instruction of the Sardar Patel University/H.P. Govt.

RULES OF REFUSAL OF ADMISSION

1. Applicants who have passed intermediate from Hindi Sahitya Samelan, Allahabad or Prabhakar are not eligible for admission in the first year for three year degree course.
2. Any candidate who passed his/her 10+2 examination after the month of July every year is not eligible to take admission in 1st year. in that particular year.
3. Any candidate who appeared in or passed his/her 10+2 examination without English as a subject shall not be eligible for admission in first semester for three year degree course.
4. In spite of the eligibility for admission, the Principal can refuse admission if the conduct of the student has not been up to the mark during the previous years.
5. The Principal reserves the right to disallow or cancel any admission without assigning any reasons.

CHANGE OF SUBJECT

The change in one Subject (DSC Subject only) is permissible in the first semester only that too within fifteen days of admission. Student may submit an application for change of subject to the Principal. The change of DSC subject will be allowed only out of available subject combinations and seat availability.

MIGRATION:

The migration of students migrating during the same course/session from any affiliated college or institution (including ICDEOL) to another affiliated college or institution shall be governed by the regulations framed by the Executive Council of the University from time to time.

FOR POST GRADUATE CLASSES

Students to the Post Graduate Classes shall be admitted according to the merit on the basis of the score of the entrance test conduct by the University 2026-27.

1. Twenty students each in the subject of Economics and Political Science, Thirty students each in the subject Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Zoology will be admitted on the basis of merit of the centralized Entrance Test conducted by the H.P. University for the concerned subject.

2. The subject and marks in qualifying examination as mentioned in the respective courses.

3. **Age Limit**

Maximum age 26 years (28 years for Girls) as on 1st July 2026.

The upper age limit shall be raised to 29 years for SC/ST Students (both girls & boys).

The Principal, at his discretion, may give relaxation of 6 months to the eligible students.

4. **Eligibility Conditions**

The minimum eligibility for admission for Postgraduate courses will be 48 credits in major subjects, 48 credits in two minor subjects, 9 credit in compulsory, with aggregate of 106 credits. Undergraduate degree and other eligibility conditions keeping in view the roster for reservations applicable.

OR

A bachelor degree with second division or with at least 45% marks (40% in case of SC/ST candidates) in aggregate in the subject concerned in three years of degree or honors in the subject concerned. In case of Physics the candidate must have passed B.Sc. with Mathematics as an elective subject.

3. Formation of Units/Sections:

The formation of the Units/No. of students in a class/subject remains the same as per the H.P. Govt. Notification of 2015, i.e. 1st unit/section of subject will be of 80 students and subsequent units/sections of 60 each depending upon the availability of faculties in the colleges. The admission in different streams will be done as per the Roster for the reservation.

admission in each elective subject:

- **SC-Schedule Caste (15%) = 18Seats**
- **ST-Schedule Tribe (7½ %) = 9Seats**
- **CUL-Cultural (5%) = 6Seats**
- **SP-Sports Person (5%) = 6Seats**
- **PWD-Persons with Disability (5%) = 3Seats**
- One seat over & above is reserved for Single Girl Child (only child of parents, that too a girl). For seeking admission against this seat parents will have to submit an affidavit in support their claim.

4. For the Degree:

- a. The candidate shall have to undergo the prescribed courses of study in a College affiliated to the H.P. University for a period not less than three academic years and not more than five academic years, should have passed the examination prescribed and fulfilled such conditions as have been prescribed therefore.
- b. For the degree (BA / B.Sc. / B.Com. / B.C.A. / B.B.A) the student will have to cumulate a minimum of 132 (old CBCS system) successful credit hours of coursework over a minimum of three and a maximum of five years from the date of admission.
- c. Provided that not more than three attempts will be allowed to pass a course.

5. Academic Year

An academic year comprising 180 working days. With six working days in a week, this would mean that each academic year will be having $180/6 = 30$ teaching / working weeks. Considering that each teaching day has 5 teaching / working hours, a teaching week would have $5 \times 6 = 30$ working / teaching hours and each academic year will have $30 \times 30 = 900$ teaching hours available for each student.

6. Credits

The term 'credit' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in terms of the number of instructional hours per week assigned to it. This explains why usually 'credit' is taken to mean 'credit hours'. For the purpose of credit determination, instruction is divided into three components:-

- (1) **Lectures (L) - Classroom lectures of one hour's duration**
- (2) **Tutorials (T) - Special, elaborate instructions on specific topics (from Lectures) of one hour duration.**
- (3) **Practical (P) - Laboratory of field exercises in which the student has to do experiments or other practical work of two hours duration.**

Each one of these components is considered as equal to one credit. One lecture (*L*) as well as one Tutorial (*T*) of one hour a week is considered as one credit, whereas one Practical (*P*) of two hours a week is considered as one credit. The total weightage given to a course in terms of credits will be equal to $L + T + P$, where *L* is the number of one hour Lectures per week, *T* is the number of one hour Tutorials per week, and *P* is the number of two hour Practical per week. This can be written in symbols as:-

$$C = L + T + P$$

Where, *C* is the credit weightage for a particular course. The total minimum credits required for an under graduate degree programme is one hundred and twenty (132).

7. Course

A course is a structured set of instructions that are imparted to a student on the basis of a syllabus or a framework.

Each course is designed variously under instructions given as Lectures, Tutorials, and Practicals (laboratory and field exercises). Usually these components are referred to as L, T and P components.

8. Course Evaluation (Evaluation of the Students)

All courses (Compulsory, Elective, Elective, and GI & H courses) involve an evaluation system of students that has the following two components:

- (i) **Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) accounting for 50% of the final grade that a student gets in a course ;and.**
- (ii) **End-Semester Examination (ESE) accounting for the remaining 50% of the final grade that the student gets in a course.**
- (i) **Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) : This would have the following**

components:

- (a) **Classroom Attendance - Each student will have to attend a minimum of 75% Lectures / Tutorials + Practicals. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in the End- Semester Examination (ESE).**
- ❖ Provided that those having between 74% and 65% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by clear reason(s) for absence to the authorized functionaries.
 - ❖ Provided that those having between 64% and 50% attendance will apply for exemption in a prescribed form accompanied by a Medical Certificate from a Government Hospital.
 - ❖ Provided that exemption from 75% attendance will be given to those participating in prescribed co-curricular activities (e.g. NCC, NSS, Youth Festivals, Sports etc.) to the extent of 25% (making the necessary attendance as 50% in these cases). However, the claim for this exemption should be supported by authenticated certificate from the concerned college authorities.
 - ❖ Provided further that those getting these exemptions will not be entitled for getting in the CCE marks for classroom attendance as given below.
- Those having greater than 75% attendance will be awarded CCE marks as follows:-

- (b) **Mid-Term Test - There will be one mid-term test covering the syllabus covered so far. The mid-term test will be of 15 marks.**
- ❖ Question paper for the mid-term test will be made by the teacher of the course and will be evaluated by him / her.
 - ❖ Evaluated test booklets will be provided to the students (shown in the class) and they can be given photocopies of the same for the cost of photocopying.
- (c) **Seminar / Assignment / Term Paper - The remaining 15 marks of the CCA will be awarded on the basis of seminar / assignment / term paper etc. that the course teacher might give to the students.**
- (ii) **End-Semester Examination (ESE) : The remaining 50% of the final grade of the student in a course** will be on the basis of a Term end examination (TEE) that will be for three hours duration and will be covering the whole syllabus of the course.
- ❖ A candidate who does not pass the examination (TEE) in any course(s) (or due to some reason is not able to appear in the TEE, other conditions being fulfilled, and so is considered as 'Fail'), shall be permitted to appear in such failed course(s)' TEE in the subsequent TEE to be held in April / May as the case maybe.
 - ❖ The registration for the TEE will be done at the time of the enrolment for the course at the beginning of the academic year. The fee for the TEE will also be collected at that time.
 - ❖ If a student is not permitted to appear in the TEE due to shortage of attendance beyond the exemption limit (<50% attendance), the candidate will be permitted to move to the next semester. Such candidates shall redo the missed semester after completing the rest of the programme.

NSS/NCC/ROVERS & RANGERS:

To inculcate the qualities of leadership, social service, discipline and patriotism among the youths, the college is running NCC/NSS/Rovers and Rangers programmes in the college.

The students who obtain a 'C' certificate in NCC are directly called for the CDS interview (without written test) and given a weight age of 2% marks while seeking admission to H.P. University courses.
 - iii) In additions, the college has rovers & rangers wing also.

LIBRARY

- 3) Due to large number of students, the days and timings of getting a book issued are fixed (See library Notice Board).
- 4) P.G. students can borrow 4 books, while U.G. students can borrow 2 books at a time for a period of 10days.
- 5) Reference books (Encyclopedias, dictionaries etc.) will not be issued.
- 6) A book should not be spoiled by underlining or marking/writing comments on it. Keep in mind that the book is also to be used by other student of the college.
- 7) In case a loss of a book or any damage, the borrower will have to replace the book with a new copy at market value.
- 8) Over-date due & fine is Rs. 1/- per day.
- 9) College also provides Book Bank facility sponsored by PTA for the needy and meritorious students

GIRL'S HOSTEL

At present college provides hostel facility for the girls students only. Because of the limited seats (presently 105) allotment will be made on merit basis. All the rooms are spacious, ventilated and well furnished. For admission in the hostel preference will be given to the wards of SC/ST provided their result of the previous year examination is either pass or re-appear, besides good moral conduct. Vacant seat will be filled from the wards of other categories. Girls students are advised to seek admission on prescribed Performa attached in the prospectus. The application form duly filled in all respect be deposited with Sh. Anoop Kumar, Clerk for hostel affairs upto the 31th August, 2022. A warden and Chowkidar are residing in hostel.

Hostel Rules:

1. Admission to the Girls Hostel will be purely on merit basis.
2. Preference will be given to SC/ST/OBC students.
3. Remaining seats, if any, will be allotted to the girls of other categories.
4. At the time of admission, at least one of the parents must accompany the ward.
5. The photograph of the Parents/Local Guardian must be pasted on the visitor's card.
6. Only approved visitors, with visitor cards are allowed to visit the hostel on Sunday and other holidays.
7. The visitors other than approved visitors will be allowed to visit the hostel only if any authority letter from the parents is submitted.
8. *Visiting Hours:*
SUNDAY/HOLIDAY 10.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m.
ON WORKING DAYS 3.00 p.m. to 5.00 p.m.
9. Visitors are not allowed to go to the students rooms. They can meet their wards only in the visitor room.
10. No student can leave the hostel without prior permission of the Hostel Warden/Principal.
11. Leave from the hostel to go home or to the local guardian if permitted will be granted once a fort night.
12. Leave from the hostel must be obtained personally from the warden at least two days before. Leave application must be supported by a letter of permission from the parents
13. Outing leave will be allowed once a week from 12.00 noon to 2.00p.m.
14. If leave is required on working days, it should be obtained from the Principal, after obtaining Warden's recommendation.
15. The boarder shall not be allowed to leave station to visit her parents/guardians alone unless written request from the parents/guardians is received.
16. Penalty may be imposed in the form of expulsion from the Hostel/College in case if a Boarder absents herself without any authorization.
17. Warden will have the right to allot/shift the room whenever required. Change of room on the basis of complaint will be deemed as 1st warning. The boarder will be issued 2nd warning for her misconduct in the form of financial penalty i.e. Rs. 500/- and in case of non-adherence to the rules/ first two warnings, the boarder may be expelled from the hostel

The following acts will be treated as misconduct.

1. Violation of hostel-rules 1-17 mentioned above.
2. Shouting, hooting or creating disturbance in the hostel.
3. Damage to the hostel property.
4. Use of cell phones.
5. Staying outside the hostel premises after the stipulated/ given timings permitted by the warden.

3. For the purpose of determining "Eligibility to appear in the University Examination," the existing provisions in the SPU ordinance shall continue to be adhered to as such.

On every Saturday, the teachers of the college give special attention to the students by imparting necessary guidance, increasing general awareness and addressing their problems within the framework of respective time-table

CODE OF CONDUCT

ATTENDANCE:

- (i) 75% lecture attendance is compulsory for appearing in the University Exams.
- (ii) An irregular student or one who remains absent continuously for 10 days his/her name will be struck-off from the college rolls. If the name of a student is struck of twice then he/she will not be re-admitted in the college.
- (iii) A student is liable to pay all dues & fines as long as his/her name remains on the college rolls.
- (iv) The Principal reserves the right of expulsion/suspension of any student.

LEAVE RULES

- (i) Application for any kind of leave on the prescribed Performa should be submitted well in time.
- (ii) Leave up to three days will be sanctioned by the Tutor. But in case of a leave for a single period the concerned teacher may be asked.
- (iii) Leave for more than three days will be sanctioned by the Principal on the recommendation of concerned subject teacher/senior tutor.
- (iv) In case of a medical leave for a period of over six days the applicant must produce a medical certificate.

Important Note: Students participating in Inter-College competitions should note that the practice/rehearsal timings should be either before the classes (early morning) or after the classes (evening) because all such activities form a part, but not the substitute of academic studies.

LIBRARY / IDENTITY CARD (I-CARD)

- (i) Every student will be issued a RFID library card which shall be valid for three years. Since I-Card is the only medium to identify/differentiate a bonafide college student from an outsider. Every student must always keep/carry it with him/her and must produce when ever required (during all working days, during examination and college function etc.) Otherwise, he/she will be considered an outsider and will be punished accordingly.

- (ii) In case the RFID/ I-Card is lost, a duplicate card will be issued only after an FIR is registered with the nearest police station and an original copy thereof is appended with such request.
- (iii) Rs. 20/- is to be deposited for a duplicate identity card.

PROCEDURE FOR MAKING 'I-CARD/ RFID- Library card'

After depositing admission fee & due every student shall get an I-Card/ RFID card from the college librarian on showing his/her fee receipt. After having affixed his/her own photograph and filled in all the entries in the RFID/I-Card, every student must get it duly signed by the respective senior tutor within one week from the date of admission positively.

ABOUT THE BACHELOR OF VOCATION (B. Voc.) DEGREE PROGRAMME

The University Grants Commission (UGC) has launched a scheme on skill development based job oriented higher education program as a part of College/University education, leading to Bachelor of Vocation (B. Voc.) degree. This degree Program is unique with the provision of multiple entry and exist at different levels of NSQF from level 5 to 7, viz. Diploma/Advance Diploma and Degree in compliance to the National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF). Multiple entry and exit will allow students the flexibility to earn and study as per their convenience. This is further explained in the Prospectus.

OBJECTIVES

- To provide multiple entry and exit options at various levels through program design in conformation to the skill eco system.
- To create requisite job role specific skilled manpower for industry at various NSQF levels as per NOS's (National Occupational Standards).
- To empower the youth leading to employment and income generating opportunities.
- To provide judicious mix of skills relating to a profession and appropriate content of general education.
- To provide flexibility to the students by means of pre-defined entry and multiple exit levels.
- To integrate skill based NSQF complaint vocational studies with the undergraduate level of higher education in order to enhance employability of the graduates and meet the industry requirements. Such graduates apart from meeting the needs of local and national industry are also expected to be competent to become part of the global workforce.

COURSE STRUCTURE

B. Voc. programme is designed with the provision for multiple exit levels. All the candidates enrolled for diploma courses or further will be treated at par from the second semester onwards. Students may exit after six months with the certificate (NSQF Level 4) or they may continue for diploma or advance diploma level courses leading to B. Voc. Degree

MULTIPLE ENTRY AND EXIT OPTIONS:

- After the completion of Semester I, the candidate will get a Certificate, and she/he may go for a job or continue studying.
- The candidate may rejoin Semester II. After the completion of Semester II, the candidate will get a Diploma, and she/he may go for a job or continue studying.
- The candidate may rejoin Semester III. After the completion of Semesters III and IV, the candidate will get an Advanced Diploma, and she/he may go for a job or continue studying.
- The candidate may rejoin Semester V. After the completion of Semesters V and VI, the candidate will be awarded a B. Voc. degree, and she/he may go for a job or become an entrepreneur, or continue studying for the M. Voc. Degree (NSQF Level 8 onwards) and can register for Ph.D. degree (NSQF Level 10) after it in Vocational studies, or they can take admission in any other masters' programme after completion of required Bridge course, or appear in any competitive exams conducted by State Public Service Commission and Union Public Service Commission.

INTERNSHIP PROGRAMME

- In every level there will be internship at the end of the semester / Year. Internship is an integral /essential component of B. Voc. degree.
- The Internship shall also carry credits to be added in the final evaluation of skill components. HPKVN (Himachal Pradesh Kaushal Vikas Nigam) is fully sponsoring the internship apart from facilitating the skill component (60) of this programme along with courseware for whole of the programme.**
- Candidates enrolled for this programme are entitled for ' Kaushal Vikas Bhatta' of Rs. 1000/-per month as per state government policy as per state government policy.**

CONDITIONS FOR ADMISSION

ELIGIBILITY CONDITIONS

- Admission to the B Voc. programme will be as per the rules and regulations of the Himachal Pradesh University.
- The eligibility criteria for admission to the B. Voc. degree programme shall be 10+2 in all streams from a recognized board;10+2 examination or an examination equivalent thereof from a Board/University established by law in India with English as a compulsory subject with 45 marks in aggregate, OR any examination of a University/ Board/ College or School in a foreign country recognized as equivalent for the above purpose by the Vice-Chancellor/Equivalence Committee on its own, OR on the recommendation of Association of India Universities with 45 marks OR as per eligibility norms of the college for admission to undergraduate courses in case of center of excellence.
- Vocational subjects under NSQF will be given weightage, equivalent to any other general education subject while considering admission to students to the undergraduate courses as per reference no. DDNo.. 1- 52/2013(CC/NSQF) dated 30.04.2014 of UGC.
- Maximum age limit for admission to B.Voc courses is 23 years for general category, 25 years for SC/ST category and 25 years for girl candidates, as on July 1 of the admission year. The Vice Chancellor may permit age relaxation as per norms.
- Reservation rules are applicable as per the rules or guidelines of the Himachal Pradesh Government.
- Students belonging to SC/ST category shall be given a relaxation in marks for admission purpose, i.e., they would require a minimum of marks in aggregate at 10+2 level.
- Compartment students shall not be allowed admission in the B. Voc. programmes.
- A candidate cannot pursue two full time undergraduate courses simultaneously.
- The University reserves the right to cancel any admission at any stage.
- In matters relating to undergraduate admissions, the decision of the Admission Committee/Vice-Chancellor, Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, shall be final.
- All legal matters pertaining to undergraduate admissions shall be subject to the Himachal Pradesh jurisdiction only.

MODE OF SELECTION

- Admission to the B.Voc. programme in Retail Management and Hospitality & Tourism (Semester-I) shall be done purely on the merit in the qualifying examination (10+2 etc.) .
- There are three categories of candidates who shall be given admission in Semester-I of the skill-based courses under NSQF.

Category 1: Students who have already acquired NSQF certification Level 4 in a particular Industry sector may opt for admission in the skill-based courses under NSQF.

Category 2: Students who have acquired NSQF certification Level 4, but may like to change their trade and enter into skill-based courses in a different trade.

Category 3: Students who have passed the 10+2 examination with conventional schooling without any background of vocational training.

Note: Regarding selection of students for B.Voc. Programme, 10 extra weightage shall be given to Category-1; 5 extra weightage shall be given to Category-2 in 10+2 examination. Final list of students shall be finalized on merit.
